You will learn from the people that have been there and done it. See what can be done with one pot and an outback oven. Recipes and Samples provided.

OUTDOOR COOKING DEMO *

(CA4)

Review the different methods, techniques, shortcuts, menus, and ways to cook in the outdoors. You will also learn safety, equipment, and ideas from some of the best in the state. Lots of samples provided.

Period 4

EXPLORING 101

(CE1)

One of Scouting's new programs for men and women is taking off, but many traditional Scouting Leaders don't know about it yet or understand it! Come to this workshop to learn about the alignment of the new and revised programs in Exploring.

Period 1

EXPLORING AND LEARNING FOR LIFE

(CE2)

Program techniques that make Posts successful, bridging the gap between Posts and Troops. Effective Learning for Life Programs will be covered.

Period 2

SAFETY OVERVIEW FOR EXPLORING ACTIVITIES

(CE3)

Safety in planning and training for safe adventures. Includes overview of BSA safety guidelines as they apply to Explorers. Includes overview of Safe Swim Defense, Safety Afloat, Climb-On Safely, and Trek Safely.

Period 3

DEVELOPING AN EXPLORER UNIT

(CE4)

Come learn how to develop an explorer program at work or in a special interest group such as professional organizations. A review of case studies will be presented as well as steps on how to bring this idea to reality with a company or organization.

Period 4

MARKETING YOUR POST

(CE5)

How to ensure the community knows your post exists? This program will explore avenues for recruitment and public information through a marketing program.

Period 5

BASIC POST ADVISOR TRAINING

(CE6) Certificate Course

What is involved today as an advisor of an active post? Topics include; where to go for additional resources, what opportunities exist for a Post, fundraising basics, as well as the policies of the BSA Exploring division. This is a double session course. **Required to complete Explorer Leader basic training.**

Period 6 & 7(double period)

VENTURING LEADERS SPECIFIC TRAINING

(VS10) Certificate Course

A course designed to introduce adult Venturing Crew Advisors and Committee members to the basic information needed to operate a crew. **Required to complete Venture Leader basic training.**

Period 1-7(all day course)

VENTURE, VENTURING OR EXPLORING

(VS1)

Within the Boy Scouts of America there has been much confusion between Venture, Venturing and Exploring. This class will define the Venture Boy Scout Program and the Venturing/Exploring program. It will explore the benefits and program features of both and look at their places in the overall program of the Boy Scouts of America.

Period 1

ADVANCEMENT AND AWARDS FOR VENTURERS AND SEA SCOUTS

(VS2)

Venturing and Sea Scouts have a plethora of opportunities for members to earn advancement recognitions and awards. This class will examine such opportunities as the Silver Award program, Ranger Award, Quest Award, Trust Award, and the Sea Scout advancement program which culminates with the Quartermaster Award. We will look at how a Venturer or Sea Scout might earn the Eagle Scout Award, and at other programs offered by the BSA and outside groups. Awards programs for the recognition of adult volunteers will also be covered.

Period 2

TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES FOR VENTURERS AND SEA SCOUTS

(VS3)

Venturing and Sea Scouting both offer many training opportunities for its youth and adult members to help enable them to offer the strongest possible program and prepare for the future. This class will examine training opportunities for Venturers and Sea Scouts such as Venturing Leadership Skills Course, Kodiak and Kodiak X, Quarterdeck Training, and SEAL (Sea Scout Advanced Leadership) Training. We will also explore opportunities for adult Venturing and Sea Scout Leaders such as basic level courses Venturing Leader Specific and Sea Scout Officers' Specialized Training, advanced level courses Wood Badge and Sea Badge, and supplemental courses such as Powder Horn, and others offered at the national level.

Period 3

ORGANIZING NEW VENTURING CREWS AND SEA SCOUT SHIPS

(VS4)

Venturing and Sea Scouting offer the largest potential growth area in the Boy Scouts of America. This class will examine the new unit development process from beginning to end, starting with new unit prospect development through to chartering and follow-up.

Period 4

VENTURING SHOOTING SPORTS

(VS9)

Venturers can shoot handguns. Learn the BSA standards for Shooting Sports including the safety rules and training required. Taught by a NRA and BSA certified instructor.

Period 6

SEA SCOUTING FOR LAND LUBBERS

(VS7)

This class will be a basic overview of the Sea Scouting program. It will introduce Sea Scouting's aims and methods, terminology, organization, activities, uniform, advancement program, and more.

Period 7

YOUTH PROTECTION TRAINING FOR ADULT VENTURING LEADERS

(VS11) Certificate Course

This training provides an overview of the developmental transition experienced by the youth of Venturing and how these transitions relate to the personal safety concerns of the Venturing program.

Period 5 & 6 (double period)

PROGRAM PLANNING

(GS1)

An overview of the essentials for effective planning. Learn how the experts plan for success. Use these essentials to create successful unit programs and special events.

Period 1

STANDARD DISTRICT STRUCTURE

(GS2)

This course will examine the organization of the local district in the Scouting program and will cover the four functions of district operations; Membership, Finance, Program, and Unit Service. The responsibilities and working relationships of the Key Three as well as the cooperation between the District Committee and the Commissioner Staff will be reviewed. The effective use of the District Committee in achieving district goals will be stressed.

Period 2 & 3 (double period) Certificate Course for first portion of District Committee Workshop

ADVANCEMENT – PROBLEM RESOLUTION

(GS3)

This course will delve into those areas where problems are likely to arise in the advancement process. Learn the facts about these issues, how they affect you and what you can do to help.

Period 3

HANDLING CHALLENGING YOUTH

(GS4)

Every pack, troop, and crew, or ship has youth who present challenges to their leaders. Discussion will cover ways to work successfully with these young people.

Period 4

EFFECTIVE CEREMONIES

(GS5)

Ceremonies are an important part of the scouting experience. Learn tips on conducting effective ceremonies when you have time to plan for them, and when you don't.

Period 5

STORYTELLING

(GS6)

Would you like to tell stories? Unsure which stories are appropriate? Learn how to tell stories and share the love of storytelling with your Scouts. It's fun for all ages.

Period 6

EVE IN THE WILDERNESS (for women only)

(GS7)

If you're a lady Scouter unfamiliar with the "woods" and would like to take your scouts camping, this class is for you. It will help you to overcome some of those fears of the outdoors and will address specific care you should take to address your personal needs.

Period 3

WOMEN IN SCOUTING (CO-ED)

(GS10)

Here is a great class to take to help you navigate the possibilities for women's roles in scouting. We've have come a long way from being Den Mothers.

Period 1

EVE ON THE TRAIL (CO-ED)

(GS11)

It will address the needs of a woman on the trail, such as clothing, comfort, toilet etiquette, monthly cycle, etc. Recommended for leaders who have males and females in their unit, whether youth, adult, or both.

Period 2

ADVANCEMENT AND RECOGNITION

(GS12)

This course deals with administration and oversight of advancement, at all levels, by the district advancement committee. The focus will be on carrying out council advancement policies, developing and administering the merit badge plan, working with units to encourage advancement, and helping commissioners and trainers explain advancement to unit leaders.

Period 3

TRAINERS' EDGE Certificate Course

(GS13)

An all day session for all trainers of BSA programs. This course in the methodologies for training is required by National for all trainers.

7:30 AM to 4:00 PM (all day course)

NATIONAL COUNCIL CONCERNS

(GS14)

A discussion led by council executives on the current national and council issues of concern. Learn the facts about these issues, how they affect you and what you can do to help.

Period 1

NEW LEADER ESSENTIALS Certificate Course

(GS15)

Learn the components of leading a successful Scouting program. Methodologies are explained and discussed. Required session for completion of Cub Scout Leader Basic Training, Boy Scout Leader Basic Training and Venturing Leader Basic.

Period 1 and 2 (double period)

Period 3 and 4 (double period)

TAX DEDUCTIONS FOR VOLUNTEER LEADERS

(GS16)

Learn what you can legally deduct on your taxes for volunteering your time. Taught by a certified Tax Accountant.

Period 3

HOW YOUR UNIT CAN GET THE HELP IT NEEDS

(GS17)

We all run into problems from time to time. Find out who, what, when, where, why, and how to get help you need. Your problems are not unique. After a hundred years of Scouting, the solutions are there for you to find.

Period 7

UNIT SELF ASSESSMENT AND “CENTENNIAL QUALITY UNIT AWARDS” (GS18)

One of BSA’s centennial goals is to make a significant improvement in program quality. The USA program enables a unit to assess its strengths and weaknesses and the CQUA program provides BSA with the opportunity to salute those units who deliver a high quality program to youth members. Learn how these programs complement each other and how to set your unit’s goals and work toward achieving them.

Period 2

HOW TO REMOVE A VOLUNTEER (GS19)

This course focuses on the ineffective volunteer, the person who just isn’t working out. What can be done? What should be done? Replacement may not be the only (or best) solution.

Period 3

EARN TRAINING AWARDS AND OTHER ADULT RECOGNITIONS (GS20)

When you complete the training, performance, and tenure requirements for your registered position, you qualify for a training award or key. Find out why you should get it and why BSA wants you to have it. As time allows, other adult recognitions will be discussed.

Period 6

YOUR PART IN BSA’S 100th ANNIVERSARY PROGRAMS (GS21)

What can you and your unit do to participate in Scouting’s centennial celebration? Find out the facts. There will never be another 100th Anniversary.

Period 7

LEAVE NO TRACE (GS22)

How to go camping in the woods and leave no trace. BSA is now converting all outdoor policy and procedures to embrace the principles of “Leave No Trace”. Be ahead of the curve.

Period 1

CPR–ADULT(CERTIFICATION) (HS1)

This course combines lectures with hands-on training and practice. Participants in this course learn how to activate EMS’ services, perform CPR and care for breathing and cardiac emergencies, avoid bloodborne pathogens exposure, and know the role of automated external defibrillators (AEDs) in the Cardiac Chain of Survival.

Period 1 thru 4 (four period class)

AN ADDITIONAL FEE OF \$27.00 IS REQUIRED FOR THIS CERTIFICATION COURSE

FIRST AID FOR SCOUTING

(HS2)

(Familiarization review of all BSA First Aid Requirements): This course combines lecture with hands-on training and practice. Participants in this course learn to recognize and respond to emergencies including shock, cardiac and breathing emergencies, heat and cold emergencies, sudden illnesses and poisonings, as well as everything from cuts and scrapes to muscle, bone and joint injuries.

Period 5 & 6 (double period)

FIRST AID JEOPARDY

(HS3)

This course will challenge your knowledge of scouting first aid skills ranging from tenderfoot requirements to the First Aid Merit Badge. Participants will compete against themselves in this highly interactive session. A GREAT refresher course for everyone.

Period 1

SAFE SWIM DEFENSE

(HS4) Certificate Course

Learn how to follow BSA procedures and methods to conduct swimming activities. This certification must be renewed every two years.

Period 2

SAFETY AFLOAT

(HS5) Certificate Course

This course covers the procedures for scout leaders to follow safe boating activities. This certification must be renewed every two years.

Period 3

SCOUTING WITH DISABILITIES AND SPECIAL NEEDS

(HS6)

This course will cover the definitions of disabilities and their medical necessities. Discussion will cover methods for these situations in your unit.

Period 4

BSA WEATHER SMART TRAINING

(HS7) Certificate Course

(BSA's Newest Training Requirement) Weather conditions—good, bad, and ugly—are an important factor in any outdoor Scouting activity. In fact, how you plan and prepare for the weather can make the difference between a great outdoor experience, a miserable or cancelled outing, and even injury or death in hazardous conditions. The Weather Smart training is designed to help you and your troop plan and prepare for hazardous weather—to make you, “Weather Smart.” **Required course for tour permits beginning January 1, 2009**

Period 5

PREVENTION AND INTERVENTION, TIPS FOR SCOUT LEADERS AND PARENTS:

(HS8)

This training focuses on enabling adult leaders and parents to increase their awareness of the incidence and effects of bullying, to create an anti-bullying culture in their Scouting units, and to empower Scouts to assist those targeted by bullies wherever it occurs. Strategies for supporting the victims of bullying and for helping Scouts who bully others develop more appropriate social skills are presented as well.

Period 6

PLANNING AND CONDUCTING A SAFE SCOUT OUTING:

(HS9)

Safe Scouting can happen if you follow the Scout motto—Be Prepared. This course will describe how to plan for and conduct a safe Scout outing. Specifically: How to create a plan for a safe Scout outing, implement the plan during a Scout outing and to understand the resources available for planning and conducting a safe Scout outing.

Period 7

CLIMB ON SAFETY

(HS10) Certificate Course

Learn BSA's recommended procedure for organizing and managing climbing and rappelling activities at all levels of the Scouting program.

Period 1

SCOUTING ON THE WEB

(IT1)

Finding and using resources on the web. Learn about a number of sites available for use by Cub Scout Leaders and Boy Scout Leaders

Period 1

KEEPING OUR SCOUTS SAFE ON THE INTERNET

(IT2)

Learn how to keep Scouts addresses, pictures, and activities private while available to those who should know.

Period 2

HOW TO CREATE A WEBSITE

(IT3)

Learn how to create and manage a website. A web site provides a unit the forum for a wide variety of purposes. You can include records, list, activities, unit history, showcase information, post photos of unit events, etc.

Period 3

NEW WEB TECHNOLOGIES FOR SCOUTING

(IT7)

Do you know about RSS feeds, WIKIs, Blogs, Social Groups (e.g. Facebook) etc., that are beginning to be used for Scouting purposes? Prospects and problems for the future will be explored.

Period 4

UNIT/DISTRICT WEB-COORDINATOR TRAINING

(IT5)

Become trained to be your unit or district web master. The ins and outs of how to manage a council web site. This class will provide an overview and will cover usage of Connecticut Rivers and Connecticut Yankee Council websites.

Period 5

INTERNET ADVANCEMENT

(IT6)

Learn how to add and update your unit advancements on line and generate associated reports.

Period 6

WHAT IS ORDER OF THE ARROW?-OA101

(OA1)

Order of the Arrow for beginners. Aims, goals, and purposes of the Order of the Arrow. Its relationship to unit, district, council, community, and the role of the Order of the Arrow Representative will be discussed.

Period 3

WHY OA?

(OA2)
